Seasons – Awesome Wonder - By Revd Ruth Eldridge

In September 2000, I started my second year of three at Cliff College in Derbyshire. For me Cliff College was an amazing place, especially as they accepted overseas students. One of those overseas students was a Methodist Deacon, and she was from Guyana, part of South America, but in the Caribbean.

We soon became good friends, and I have since travelled to the Caribbean to work with her in two of her appointments.

Guyana is nothing more than rainforest, so it only gets two seasons, which are very different from here in the UK. Guyana has a hurricane season, and a non-hurricane season. The temperature is pretty much constant, as is the humidity, so when my friend with the grand name, Vincia Celestine came to Cliff College, she was absolutely in awe of our seasons.

She experienced, cold, snow and ice for the first time. Spring with all the new life, flowers, shrubs, leaves springing into life, and dry summer days. But her favourite, was Autumn. She had never seen such beautiful colours on trees, and she watched with interest as the shades of the leaves changed preparing to drop for winter. Vincia was like a child seeing things for the first time. She said to me, "All those hymns I have sung since I was a child make sense to me now..... 'The purple headed mountain', 'Great is Thy Faithfulness, Summer and Winter, Spring-time and Harvest', and she listed all the hymns that had meant nothing to her about changing seasons, that now had new meaning to her here in the UK.

Christian Values

*Many voices are calling for the return of Christian values. But what are they?
This is my attempt at a summary:*

Truth – known through divine inspiration or the patience of science. Truth can never be just a matter of opinion.

Law – that moral law is inherent in the nature of things, especially human nature.

Justice – where all are equal before the law and the vulnerable are protected.

Responsibility – that although we are shaped by circumstance, we are still called to make the most of the hand we are given.

Gratitude – for Creation as God-given and wonder for the gift of life.

Respect - for others and for all living things and for the planet.

Compassion - for the weak, the vulnerable and the struggling.

Community - of family and neighbourhood, widening to encompass country and the world beyond.

Marriage - as a microcosm of society, giving stability, contentment and a safe foundation for children.

Humility - for humanity is raw and unfinished and all things fall short of the glory of God.

Hope - that all can be made new and sometimes even suffering can become redemptive.

Forgiveness - creating room for healing and restoration.

Peacemaking – a crucial ministry of reconciliation.

Love - as the basis and goal of all things.

Today's values include tolerance, individualism and personal freedom. Are these Christian? Christian history has hardly been marked by tolerance – it was the religious wars and the Enlightenment that brought this to the forefront. Clearly the Reformation too helped to create the modern outlook. Yet links can be made – see Jesus' words, *"judge not lest you be judged"*. There is plenty scope for Bible study and discussion as with all of the above.

Some of these values we owe to Judaism; some common to many religions, and some to all humanity. In the world of politics, some are stressed by the right and some by the left. I have kept until last the value that I feel is the most characteristic of Christianity – that of **Service**. Jesus said, *"I come as one who serves"*. It is a mark of Britain's claim to be a Christian country that we speak of a wide range of public services and that those who would lead are expected to be servants to all.

It was also noted that Barclays Bank, who have been using one of our rooms to provide a service to their customers, are withdrawing that facility, and so we will be losing them as a tenant. Cheryl grew up in Crouch End, North London. Secondary school never suited her, but trips to the London Theatre kindled a life-long love of theatre and AmDram.

On leaving school, she completed a 3-year hairdressing apprenticeship but then decided to see the world by joining the Army. On discovering the only part of the world she'd see was Aldershot she bought herself out after 3 months!

She offered to help with the local Cub Scouts and it was there that she met and married Brian. With their two daughters, Lorraine and Kate, they first lived in Enfield but then moved to Ware, in Hertfordshire.

Being a mum was her top priority but later she became a teaching assistant in a Special Needs School, then worked in a jeweller's and finally went back to special needs education in her local secondary school.

In her 'spare time' she was a steward and pastoral visitor at Leaside Methodist Reformed Church; a telephone Samaritan; chairperson of the local Action for Children group; and on the Scout Appointments Committee.

She also joined Ware Dramatic Society; she was on stage once or twice, but mostly was prompt for their productions.

She moved to Ledbury following Brian's retirement and became a member at Ledbury Methodist Church where she has been a steward and pastoral visitor.

She joined LADS (Ledbury Amateur Dramatic Society) and prompted for many productions, especially their 'legendary pantos'. She also joined U3A, Ledbury Walkers Group and was a steward at the Heritage Centre.

In December 2019 she was told she had bile duct cancer. Since then she had five major operations, but still continued to do as much as she could. She died on 20th September 2025 in St. Michael's Hospice after the original cancer returned, but was inoperable.

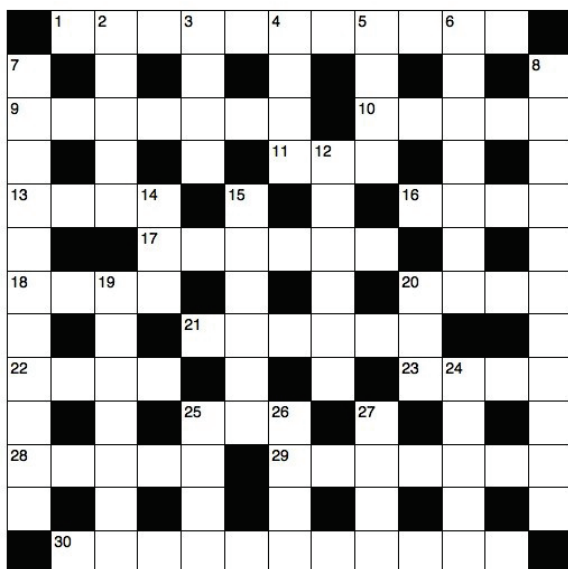

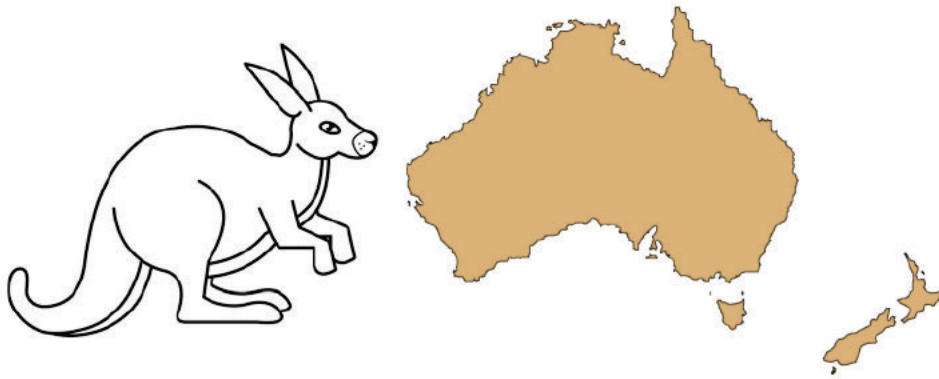

Remembrance

This time of year as the days grow shorter lends itself to the telling of stories. Stories offer more than just entertainment, they can teach, they can bring us closer to each other, and they help us to remember. Remembering not just what has happened in the past, but also what we value.

November is a month full of remembrance. For the Church it starts with All Saints' and All Souls' when we remember those in the faith who have gone before us. Then across the UK we mark Remembrance Sunday and Remembrance Day, recalling those who have lost their lives in war, as well as echoing the call from after the First World War of "never again". As the month comes to an end the Church marks the beginning of Advent, a time of preparation before Christmas.

Christianity is a religion of remembrance. Each week we meet together to worship and during that time we share stories from the lives of people from 2000 or more years ago. These same stories are shared time and time again, year after year. In these stories there are heroes and baddies, good deeds and bad deeds. We are often tempted to place ourselves in the role of hero but even within the stories we find ourselves challenged to see that's not always the role we fit.

That's what good stories do, they don't just entertain, they also challenge. The purpose of hearing the same stories time and time again, to remember events of the past, is not just to wistfully look at them and leave them there. It is to learn from them, be challenged by them, perhaps even be transformed by them. But the challenge of remembrance is to recognise that our past is full of both good and bad and we need to acknowledge that. If we don't we risk our transformation being incomplete and will struggle to move forward.

So as we take time to remember this month let us listen closely to the stories we tell and let us be challenged and changed by them.

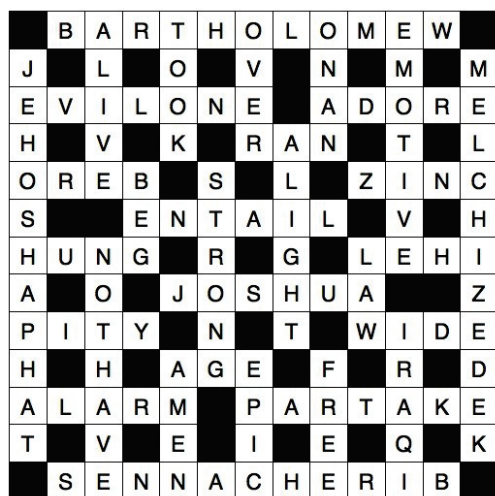
