District & Circuit News

As I type this, we are preparing for the circuit visit by our new Co-Chair Revd Rachel Deigh, This visit is her catching up with the Circuit Stewards, the reps to Synod and the Superintendent. She is coming to find out about our circuit, as part of visits she is undertaking this year to all 20 of the circuits in the new West Midlands District. We will be inviting Rachel to preach in our churches in the new year.

Revd Phil Warrey has been appointed as the Chair of the District Property Advisory Committee, and also in this role has a seat on the District Policy Committee and the District Resourcing Mission Committee. He says:- "It's good to be involved in the District and to be able to network, and have an ear to the ground on policy and where the grants are!".

Bromyard Methodist's new activity for young people "Soul Space", had a district Micro Grant of £200 for start up costs. Ledbury's Women's Breakfast had a grant of £500+ towards their awayday. Ledbury Manse solar panels were half paid by a District Eco Grant.

Bromyard has a new Treasurer, Chris Ottershaw has taken over from Chris Knight. A big thank you to both of them.

Bromyard has started a new piece of Children's work, an organic pilot project, working with Hereford Diocese, and funding from the Police & Crime Commissioner's Office, & HCF Small Sparks Fund, and a District Microgrant, more information in our next issue. But Praise the Lord!

A Regular Guy from the Street

In August, Ben Gvir, the Israeli Minister of Home Security, showed a video of himself mocking a gaunt prisoner in solitary confinement – an act which demeaned all Israel. The prisoner was Marwan Barghouti, who has served twenty three years as Israel's most important Palestinian prisoner. Soon after this visit Barghouti was reported to have been beaten unconscious during a prison transfer.

Marwan Barghouti is a terrorist – a term often used to condemn without further thought. For Palestinians he is a freedom fighter and one of the few who could unite Palestinians in a future state. For this reason alone, Israel is determined to keep him in gaol for life. As a former leader of Fatah, he may share responsibility for some of the worst atrocities committed in Israel during the second intifada . On the other hand, his trial was deeply flawed by international standards and the evidence unclear. He was acquitted on 21 counts of murder but convicted on the general charge of terrorism. We know that his policy had once been to limit attacks to police and soldiers who were intruding into Palestinian territory. These are his own words:

"I am not a terrorist neither am I a pacifist. I am simply a regular guy from the Palestinian street advocating only what every other oppressed person advocates - the right to help myself in the absence of any help from anyone else."

Several 'terrorists' have become leaders of their country – Makarios in Cyprus, Kenyatta in Kenya, Martin McGuiness in Northern Ireland, Nelson Mandela in South Africa and even the al-Qaeda leader, al-Sharaa of Syria, welcomed at the White House even as I write this article.

Whilst not forgetting the many Arab atrocities committed against Jews, we might remember also that several Prime Ministers of Israel were 'terrorists'. David ben-Gurion approved Operation "Cast thy Bread" when Palestinian village wells were contaminated with typhoid. Menachem Begin was a leader of the Irgun which killed over 100 men, women and children in the Arab village of Deir Yassin. Yitzhak Shamir was a leader of Lehi, which plotted the assassination of the British Minister, Lord Moyne. Ariel Sharon led Unit 101 in the massacre at Qibya in the West Bank where 69 died, two thirds of them women and children.

We could hope and pray that Marwan Barghouti could be a 'Mandela' as some believe. He has supported the recognition of Israel, the Oslo Accords and a two state solution. Before his arrest, he had won the regard of several Israeli politicians. Most European nations support his release and President Trump has been toying with the idea. Mandela was strongly influenced by the Christian teaching of forgiveness. Barghouti is a Muslim, who could yet show that Islam is not lacking in mercy. It takes more than one to make peace. Mandela had de Klerk. Has Israel a partner for peace?

At St. John's, the donations for coffee and tea on Saturdays and after the morning services are given to a different charity each month. In November, we supported **the Cart Shed**, which works with adults and young people experiencing mental health difficulties or with those who have emotional imbalances in their lives.

Based in north Herefordshire, they use enriching and engaging woodland activities such as woodcraft and coppice craft as well as horticulture to empower people to self-manage their mental and physical health in a sustainable way. Sessions are run by tutors, occupational therapists and mental health practitioners to help build confidence, identify barriers to skills development and explore other issues that might be making life challenging.


The organisation has strong social, ethical, and environmental objectives and an ethos that



Christian Values: a reply

I was intrigued by Graham's list of Christian values and I do thank him for his article. However, I would propose that the only value that is entirely central and, probably uniquely Christian, is forgiveness. This also encompasses all the other listed values.

Forgiveness is central to Christianity because it puts Christ's salvific action at the centre. It's probably also the thing that we find the most difficult to do or to receive. Forgiveness redeems the past creation and begins the new creation. This was begun at the Incarnation in God's costly act of love which, apparently, died on the Cross and yet, ultimately, defeated darkness and brought us all into the light and hope of the dawning new creation - borne of the reconciliation of forgiveness for the oppressor and the oppressed.

Forgiveness is costly and it is not about tolerance but it is about truth because it shines a light on the darkness we find within ourselves and others (Jn. 3:19-20). "And this is the judgement, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed."

Many people say they want justice when they have been wronged, but what is justice and how does that differ from revenge and punishment while still taking sin seriously? This brings to mind the example of Desmond Tutu's Truth and Reconciliation Committee in South Africa and those who practise restorative justice because there can be no healing, justice, peace or reconciliation without true forgiveness.

Forgiveness requires humility for both the oppressor and the oppressed and will ultimately lead to freedom for both rather than what we see so often in our world where old enmities, often from the far distant past, are reignited in conflict. That humility is also required for service in order to practise the servant leadership that Graham advocates.

Christianity, for me, is not a religion of propositions or rules but one of relationship to Christ and each other and, as the redeemed people of God - forgiven and forgiving - then we are called to be a light to the world by our example (Mt. 5:14).

Finally, I do agree with Graham that "love is the basis and goal of all things" because God is Love and his love was shown by the sacrificial death on the Cross for the forgiveness and reconciliation of His creation.





Safeguarding Sunday

This was marked on Sunday 16th November and congregations were introduced to some very powerful material, including the poem reproduced below. Due to some technical issues at St. John's, or if you were unable to attend, you may not have heard these words . (Source: 'thirtyone:eight')

Safe

What does it mean to feel, and be, safe?

It's holding the hand of someone you love. Or a parent's magic kiss on a grazed knee. It's a baby sound asleep in a loving embrace. That's safe.

It's when you're wrapped up warm and tight, indoors on a dark and cold night, somewhere you know, somewhere that's comfortable, where you can just 'be'. That's safe.

It's knowing you're not on your own because there's someone there at the end of the phone, to call or to text when you're feeling alone. That someone you can always rely on, that shoulder to cry on when things get tough. That's safe.

Safe can be the shield, the defence, the fortress, a lighthouse guiding you through the storm, or the harbour offering protection when the seas get rough.

Or safe can be that big red traffic sign that says stop, there's danger ahead.

And isn't that what the church is called to be? A refuge for the refugee, a sanctuary for the broken. A space for the hurting to find healing, a place for the last, the least, the lost, those on the margins and those in the centre, a place to find meaning. For God's eternal banner over me and you is love. And there is no fear in love for His perfect love casts out all fear and is safe.

We've not lived up to that expectation, we've fallen short, instead we've prioritised our own reputation, and if that's not cause for lamentation, I don't what is.

I don't mean to be the voice of condemnation; It's just time to prioritise the conversation. Giving space for those who need to, to share, to be believed, be renewed and find restoration.

If those things that were once kept out of sight, and covered up, are brought into the open. And we make space for the unspeakable things to be spoken. Their power can be broken. Because a church that faces its shortcomings, and gives space to listen, reflects something of the kingdom of God. A church which truly loves is a church striving to be safe.

So, it's time to put safeguarding on the church's agenda, to change the culture of yesterday, to pause and remember. Because safe is bold, it's the firm foundation beneath our feet, it means we can stand and take the leap of faith to have those conversations and be a church that's safe.

Advent

Sunday 30th November was the first of the four weeks of Advent but, aside from enjoying opening Advent calendars, what is it all about?

Have you ever watched the sunrise? The light begins as a very faint glow on the eastern horizon but gradually the glow becomes bigger and brighter, changing from reds to oranges and yellows, as the sun rises higher and higher in the sky dispelling the darkness.

The word advent means coming and so Advent is a time of waiting and preparing for the coming of the Light, our Lord Jesus Christ, into this dark world of ours. The Light came over 2000 years ago and it was temporarily eclipsed at the Crucifixion, but it was still there. Just as the sun rises fully into the sky and dispels all the darkness, so Jesus will come fully into our world and all the darkness within us and around us will be obliterated. Until that day we can have glimpses of that love, hope, joy and peace, not just in Advent, Christmas or Easter but always as he comes to us now if we invite him in.

"Behold I stand at the door and knock; if anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with him, and he with me." (Rev. 3:20).
